Leanne wanted to pray for the baby. She herself had been a premature baby causing her parents much anxiety.

It was no regular Junior Sunday School class on that cold December morning. Right at the start, Brother Miller, who was in charge of the class that day, told the children about little Louis, who had been born three days before and was now in intensive care. "The baby is not doing well. The doctors do not know if he will survive. Let's kneel and pray for little Louis before we begin with our class?"

Four-year-old Leanne announced: "I would like to pray. I was also in hospital when I was a baby. Everyone prayed for me. Now I can also pray for the baby."

Brother Miller knew that Leanne had been born prematurely. She had spent the first three months of her life in hospital. Her parents had been worried sick, as the doctors had been unable to say with certainty whether Leanne would even survive more than a few days.

"I will never forget these moments," Brother Miller writes. "These were intimate moments of solidarity with parents who feared for their child's life. It was also beautiful for us teachers to see that our little ones, even at their young age, already know about the power of a prayer and already feel the need to help carry the burdens of others."

Leanne's parents had explained to their little girl that she was the result of many prayers and nothing short of divine miracle. She had grasped that she was not able to help another sick child through her prayer.

In the meantime, little Louis is doing better. He is still in hospital, but the doctors are confident. In fact, they are astonished at his progress.

The prayer of this child should also inspire us to pray for others.

Petitioning God on behalf of someone else is a big part of our faith. Interceding for others – be it for family, friends, acquaintances, people we work and deal with, or people we just hear about – apart from being a beautiful Christian gesture is very rewarding.

Answer:

The first call came from Jesus: "Follow me" Then the Apostles called their fellow workers and equipped them. Let me quote from the Q+A, No 173 "Jesus Christ established only one ministry, the apostle ministry. All the other ministries in his Church have emerged from this. They were created when necessary and could be traced back to the various spiritual talents"

As you know that Brothers are called into a specific ministry and ordained by the Apostle through the laying-on of hands and prayer.

We have no right to call it a sin or even a curse when someone does not continue the ministry he was entrusted with. There are many, many complex situations which can make a Brother unable to carry on in the ministry. Resigning is often an act of honesty and much better than to continue by pretending. We never know what turmoil is inside a soul. Therefore resignation from a ministry is a very personal and private matter between the Brother and God.
